Access Issues

If you require assistance with anything, please ask a member of convention staff or speak to the ops hub. If you wish to do so, you can pick up an access card with appropriate wording from registration. These can be personalised to fit your personal circumstances if you prefer.

We're sorry, but we only have one access ramp, not two as marked on the map. This means that, while all the spaces on the ground floor are still accessible, the route is rather convoluted.

The gender neutral toilets have been relocated to be the toilet block outside Monarch.

No Posters

You are not permitted to put up posters anywhere in the hotel. This includes mirrors, walls and windows, as well as the more traditional toilet doors.

Masks Optional

Some programme items are explicitly mask optional. You can find which they are by using the 'mask optional' tag in the con guide or looking on the printed errata sheet.

Please remember that some people cannot wear masks for medical or other reasons.

Hotel Parking

We had previously announced that parking for non-residents was £14 per day. Unfortunately, we had misunderstood and nonresidents will be charged the full commercial rate. Cheaper parking is available in the area, including at Resorts World (£17 for up to twelve hours but reduced to £3 if you spend £20 or more in Resorts World bars or restaurants and have your ticket discounted by Guest Services) and at Birmingham International Station (£12 per weekday, £9 at weekends).

Hotel residents will be charged £10 per day. Please speak to the hotel reception to ensure that you pay this reduced rate, as the code we were given (JAKGS) doesn't appear to be working in the app.
